Vicar's Report



As I sit down to write this report, I've been the Vicar of the Benefice of the Redeemer for just over a year. What a year!

After a couple of months study (and moving) leave, it was a joy to be installed and inducted as Vicar on 25th Feb. Thanks to Zoom, many were able to join the service despite us still being in the midst of the pandemic. 2021 has in many ways been a year of uncertainty. The risk of covid has been ever present, disrupting fellowship and hospitality and causing anxiety and illness. It is taking us a while to re-establish and re-invigorate many church routines.

However our unchanging and mighty Lord has been hugely gracious in so many ways:

I'm so grateful for a wise, godly and supportive Leadership Team, Wardens and PCC.

The preaching and teaching of our Licensed Lay Ministers, especially at our evening services, has been a spiritual encouragement for many of us.

We have an enthusiastic and committed team of Sunday School and Creche leaders.

It's been a genuine encouragement to see so many seeking to serve God in different ways - spiritually and practically.

Since the lifting of restrictions, we've seen people join all four of our congregations.

Our youth have started attending events with young people from other local churches.

We continue to enjoy a strong a fruitful partnership with our local schools.

After families being instructed in the basics of the gospel, eight people have been baptised, including two adults.

Our men's and ladies' groups have thrived and are becoming a place where people of different ages and stages can have fun and encourage each other.

It has been particularly moving to share the Lord's Supper together after over a year of not being able to.









As you read through this booklet, I'm sure you'll find many more encouragements to add to the ones above!

As a Benefice we continue in our mission:

Seeking to know Christ better and to make Christ better known

When we looked at the early church in the book of Acts, we saw that, in order to do that, we need to hold firm to the key priorities of

The Bible - reading, understanding and meditating on God's word

Prayer - speaking to our generous Father is heaven

Relationships - developing our fellowship as a church family.

At the start of 2021, all our church members answered an anonymous questionnaire to get an idea of where we are spiritually.

It was a great encouragement to see that through 2020:

92% had grown in their faith

80% had some confidence in sharing the gospel

73% had identified and were using their gifts to serve God and the church

It was also very clear that weekly church attendance and being part of some sort of Bible study group had the greatest impact on people's growth in faith and service of God. You can get an idea of what these groups do later in this booklet. Although statistics are helpful for seeing where we're at, as a church our true desire is knowing God and people. Paul writes to the church in Colossae:

So then, just as you received Christ Jesus as Lord, continue to live your lives in him, rooted and built up in him, strengthened in the faith as you were taught, and overflowing with thankfulness.

Colossians 1:6

Please join me in praying this for ourselves and for our churches in the year ahead.

<u>Licensed Lay Ministers Report</u> Written by Duncan Stowe & John Ashcroft

We now have three main Sunday services across the benefice; one at Church of the Saviour and two at St. Bartholomew's. We also have Friday Live up at Church of the Saviour. As in 2020, so in 2021 we had restrictions because of Covid regulations. Fortunately, we have some tech-savvy people around and so were able to hold one service every Sunday over Zoom. When churches were able to re-open, numbers were limited and so the service was conducted in church and over Zoom. Eventually we added Sunday @ Seven back to our services but only over Zoom, although towards the end of the year we managed to get back into church, only for the new variant to put its oar in.

Because of family situations with regard to safeguarding your Licensed Lay Ministers were not always able to play as full and active a part as usual. In fact, it fell upon John to do the bulk of the work inside church when we re-opened.

Irrespective of the service, the team, Chris, John, Duncan, Geoff, and Philip set out to convey the main truths of the gospel and, hopefully, build up members of the congregations in their own faith, by showing them how the gospel can be applied to their own specific situation, be it at home, work or socializing.

For a short period of interregnum, we had to manage without Chris as he had to have a break from our church before he was inducted. This was achieved with the aid of visiting ministers and the members of the leadership team playing their part including extra pastoral responsibilities and in taking funerals at The Saviour and or the crematorium. During this period the newly trained worship leaders came into their own. We worked with them collectively as a team. We were all relicensed this year to the Benefice, so theoretically are good for the next three years.

Besides being seen active at the front of church, your Licensed Lay Ministers (Readers) are also busy behind the scenes leading study groups and doing other works to further the promotion of the gospel, mainly over Zoom, except for a tiny period when we managed to meet face to face. Hopefully this coming year we will be fully back to normal, but still streaming over Zoom for those unable to get to church.

Sunday School

Sunday School delivery has gradually been able to move from remote learning via Zoom during the lockdown period, to a return to the normality of face to face teaching on site. This has meant we can do far more interactive and creative activities that everyone reports they enjoy.

Over the last twelve months we've searched and prayed for extra leaders and helpers, and several people have answered the call to join our merry throng. This has enabled us to spread the workload as we now have a host of leaders and volunteer helpers for both the younger and older groups. Both groups have also seen growth in their numbers of

attendees this academic year which is really pleasing.



The curriculum plans we follow come from two resources - 'New City Catechism' for the older group, and 'Promises' teaching materials for the younger group. The New City Catechism is a modern day resource aimed at helping children and adults alike learn the core doctrines of the Christian faith via 52 questions and answers. Each week children are guided to revisit prior learning then

assess one 'Big question' such as "What is your only comfort in life and death?" Answer. That I am not my own, but belong—body and soul, in life and in death—to my faithful Saviour, Jesus Christ. Each lesson we access the question we're studying through group discussion, Bible reading, an activity of some description, aiming to commit a verse to memory and closing in prayer.

The 'Promises' curriculum is very similar in its aims and seeks to convey each lesson's message through a variety of activities such as stories, songs and crafts.









The leaders agree that the current resources are well planned and creative and weare enjoying delivering them as much as the children appear to be enjoying engaging with them.

In addition to the lessons, some of our youths have been able to take part in some extracurricular activities such as attending a cook out at the local scouts hut and visiting the Blackburn Ice Arena to watch the Blackburn Hawks play ice hockey. These events were organised and promoted by a network of local churches.



We were delighted that both Sunday School groups could join forces with children from the crèche to perform our nativity; an annual opportunity for proud mums and dads to encourage their budding

actors whilst sharing the joy of celebrating the birth of our Lord, Jesus Christ.

To help our groups continue to go from strength to strength, leaders have engaged in training and have some more to come as this report goes to print. We've been enabled to get to know each other more through a social at the vicarage too, and we communicate regularly through our WhatsApp group. We're happy to report that Sunday School is thriving!

Mums Monthly Bible Study Rachael Anderton

A few mums with younger children have been meeting at the vicarage once a month on a Saturday morning for a catch-up and bible study. We arrange for husbands (or someone else!) to look after our kids so we can have some precious time to chat, pray and look at the Bible together. We've been working our way through Luke's gospel this year; finding out how Jesus is the promised Saviour who has come for the poor, the oppressed and the needy. We've also seen the surprising nature of his kingdom, and what Jesus wants from someone who desires to be a part of it.



If you're a mum with younger children, especially if you would struggle to get to a weekly home group, then come and chat to me- you don't have to know much about the Bible to come; we're a friendly bunch and you'd be welcome to join us!

Monday Bible Study Group Duncan Stowe

We have a mixed group meeting up at Church of the Saviour on Monday's starting at 11.00am and lasting $1-1^1/2$ hours. We start off with coffee and biscuits, sometimes cream scones, to study God's Word and apply it to our own situations. There are people from Church of the Saviour and people from St. Bartholomew's, although at the moment it is weighted in St. Bartholomew's favour. The last study of 2021 was on Hebrews. We next looked at Lamentations, our studies were on Zoom. We carried on with a study on James followed by Isaiah. We then had our summer break and recommenced in September by looking at Acts 1 & 2 when we then looked at Psalm 104. After that we did the Explorer course that all the groups did which took us up









towards Christmas. When we come to the summer and Christmas breaks we usually end with a meal, unfortunately this year we have only been able to manage a meal just before our Christmas break. At present our numbers are static. People can put their views forward or just listen, no pressure is applied and different points of view are always welcomed as from them we can usually add to our understanding of the Bible. We are open to all and look forward to having others join us so that we do not become complacent in our studies. If you wish to come, speak to me at St. Bartholomew's or Sylvia Lord at Church of the Saviour, whenever we are allowed to meet together in groups again, to make sure we are holding one when you want to start coming, as sometimes we have to cancel one of our sessions if too many have other things to do on the same day. We also do not meet on Bank holidays. Please think about joining us not only to learn more about what the Bible says but to enjoy fellowship with like-minded people. We laugh a lot and sometimes even the leader has to succumb to the wider point of view.

Monday Night House Group Margaret Mitchell

2021 has been a strange year for our House Group. We have met all the way through successfully on Zoom with the exception of a couple of face-to-face meetings in September. As we meet in the evening, 7-8.30ish, we decided Zoom winter meetings would be more acceptable to those travelling a distance from Darwen and the far side of Blackburn.



Over the year our study material has been varied, including material on Isaiah and Romans, a USPG Lent study, a Six steps Encouragement course and one or two free standing studies relating to Christian life. Wednesday House Group report written by Michael and Lorraine Turnbull





<u>Treasurer's Report</u>

Nan Goodall

St Bartholomew's Church and Church of the Saviour are joined together in the benefice of 'The Redeemer' and each church has its own Parochial Church Council [PCC], St Bartholomew's Church PCC is responsible for the financial dealings of St Bartholomew's Church.

As Treasurer I merely implement their decisions. The Treasurer oversees the income and expenditures of the Church. I manage the cash flow and record all financial transactions carried out on behalf of the PCC and ensure they are properly authorised. I monitor the PCC's finances throughout the year, and alert the PCC if any difficulties are likely to occur. I work with the PCC to meet all its financial obligations, especially Parish Share, clergy expenses and insuring the church and its buildings etc.

One of our major income streams comes in via our congregational donations - either direct to our bank account, envelopes, cash in the collection box or contactless giving. Other streams of revenue include hire of the church premises, fees for banns, weddings, funerals and burials. Included in income is fundraising by any social or other activity, adhoc donations, legacies and grants for specific purposes are also counted. Expenses are many and varied, large and small, from the parish share to the toilet rolls that we use on site. We also have a number of missionary projects that we support. Some of the expenses that are paid are due across the benefice so every 3 months, quarterly over the year, I invoice Church of the Saviour for these and they reimburse St Bartholomew's Church directly to our bank.

I also organise the Gift Aid Claim to HMRC, in April, after checking that all the information is correct. This makes a great difference to our yearly cash flow bringing in approximately six to seven thousand pounds per year, so if you pay income tax, but do not take part, please consider doing so. Our Church Accounts run from January 2021 to December 2021. I send the yearly accounts information off to Turner & Turner at Preston in January of the following year, and these are what are presented to you at the APCM. During 2021 our accounts showed a loss of approximately £2,000.00.

Whilst the Christians Against Poverty [CAP] centre is financially independent, the Benefice facilitates this charity by allowing the Blackburn centre's accounts to be managed alongside our own, therefore their bank account runs alongside the two St Bartholomew's accounts. Monthly I authorise the payment of Sheila Fielding's CAP salary and other related monies. These are recorded in the accounts under the column 'Restricted' funds.









Brownies Gail Hull

January 2021: We were still meeting on Zoom at the start of the year. During January we started working on a challenge badge called "Pack Your Guiding Bags". We looked at a variety of landmarks and had a go at building our own out of recycling.

February 2021: We continued working on the challenge badge. As part of this we did some potato printing, made fruit cocktails and designed and made a kite. The girls did a wonderful job at flying them.

March 2021: This month saw our girls trying to break a variety of world records, making masks and designing their own Easter bonnets. We couldn't choose a winner as they were all fantastic!

April 2021: We only had two meetings this month, and the girls worked on some skill builders from the Brownies programme.

May 2021: We started working on another challenge badge this month (Midsummer Mapness). We looked at maps and summer festivities. The girls also designed and made their own 3D rooms in boxes.

It was amazing to see everyone again and to see how much taller our Brownies had become! We played lots of games and completed the Harry Potter hunt that is set up around the site.

July 2021: We continued meeting at Canalside until the school summer holidays began. The girls worked hard to complete their camp badges, but also had lots of fun pond-dipping, making their own fire-branded coasters, doing soft archery and playing lots of games.

August 2021: Summer holidays- no meetings

September 2021: We were allowed to meet indoors again, so we moved our meetings back to the church this month. The girls worked on their live smart badges, which saw them using hammers and screwdrivers, looking at spending money more carefully and exploring their talents. We gave out our first ever Gold award to Ellie- hopefully we'll be doing this a lot more!

October 2021: The girls worked on their network badges this month, which saw them making outfits from recycling, thinking about their ambitions, and having a go at building tall towers with playing cards.









November 2021: This month the girls worked on their communicate badges and we explored things like mime, musicality, how music makes us feel and how to project our voices. Our unit celebrated its 65^{th} birthday this month and the girls designed badges for the occasion. The winning badge was designed by Poppi and this has now been made and distributed to all members of our group.

December 2021: We only held two meeting this month. The girls did some Christmas craft activities during the first one and designed cards for a competition. One of our girls, Tiana, produced the winning design and these were sent out to all Girlguiding members across Blackburn Division. For our last meeting of the year we had a joint party with the Rainbows group. We played lots of games, made a bauble and had some snacks and drinks.

Future 2022: Our unit continues to flourish, with lots of our girls working hard towards earning their Bronze, Silver and Gold awards. We are hoping to plan some trips and maybe a holiday later this year if the guidance allows.

Safeguarding Sheila Fielding

Benefice Safeguarding Co-ordinator

There were no safeguarding or data protection incidents over the course of 2021 and I would like to thank all concerned for their diligence and care towards our church members in this respect.

Safeguarding training for all those involved with children, young people and vulnerable adults has now resumed following the break during the lockdown period, although mainly online. This has proved problematic for those with limited internet access or experience, but those affected have generally been able to overcome this by using the benefice office facilities.

I continue to carry out DBS checks and adhere to safer recruitment procedures for people taking on new roles within the church and to regularly monitor the DBS status of those continuing in roles.

The parish safeguarding self-audit was completed in time for the Archdeacon's visit to the parish in November and there were no items of concern to be actioned.

The PCC has complied with the duty under section 5 of the Safeguarding and Clergy Discipline Measure 2016 (duty to have regard to House of Bishops' guidance on safeguarding children and vulnerable adults).

Thank you to everyone for your patience in adhering to safeguarding measures, making our church a safe place to worship.













Superstars Sheila Fielding



Since starting up on Thursdays after Covid restrictions were lifted, it's been great to see the play group grow to healthy numbers! Christians Against Poverty Sheila Fielding (Centre Manager)

In 2021, we helped 31 new clients, eight of whom went on to begin a Debt Management Plan with CAP. As a result of their involvement with us, we celebrated one person making a first-time commitment to Christ and another re-committed his life. Seven clients became debt-free over the year and, after working with us initially, seven others felt sufficiently empowered to manage their finances successfully alone.

Covid disrupted operations again this year and, although we had more referrals come in and clients start their debt-free journey with us, many more dropped out of the system before we could fully prepare their cases. We were able to meet face-to-face with a small number of clients, but the majority of meetings took place by telephone and I believe this was the key to clients dropping out. This highlights the importance of relationships in our work and I am indebted to those volunteer Befrienders who maintained contact with clients and encouraged them to keep going. Home visits are a unique aspect of CAP's debt help, setting us apart from all other debt management organisations and I very much look forward to resuming these visits in 2022.

God has been very faithful in providing the funds needed over this year and we are currently able to continue operating until July 2022. This provision came in the form of grants received from Laing Family trusts (through CAP central), Postcode Neighbourhood Trust and Churches Together in Lancashire. Local churches and individuals from our own and neighbouring churches continue to donate regular gifts and we had tremendous responses to our appeals both for the general running costs of the Centre and then also for clients' Christmas gifts. People responded so generously to our appeal for clients that we had enough surplus to pay for future client events.

One of my favourite duties as Centre Manager is to deliver gifts to clients at Christmas and this year was no exception. These are just some of the responses:

"Thank you so much for the gifts. I'm completely overwhelmed with your kindness. Thank you for everything. I hope you have a lovely Christmas and New Year. God bless."

"What a wonderful thing to do!"

"You have made Christmas meaningful and I'm very grateful"

It is a lovely opportunity to catch up with clients and listen to stories of how their lives are improving with the help and advice of CAP. Thank you to all who gave to this appeal.

I must also thank our church leadership teams for their support and encouragement, alongside my team of prayers, befrienders and volunteers, without whom I simply could not function. You bring love, joy, laughter and blessing into some very grim situations. Thank you.
